

Motueka Catchment Collective March update and Gravel Zoom

Because of Covid, our next general informative gathering will be done as a Zoom. It's on Monday 11th April at 7pm and is on the topic of gravel. It follows from the recent research done by TDC on gravel, particularly in the upper catchment area, and concerns raised by members at the meeting that we had on flooding. If you are on the Collective's database and get our monthly updates, you will receive the link to join the meeting. If you want to receive the regular updates, please email

motcatchment@gmail.com to receive it. We only send out around two emails a month so you don't get bombarded. We will also post details for the meeting on the new tapaweracommunity.nz website that has been established by Tapawera Connect. We are looking to have a webpage there that covers what is happening in the upper part of the catchment, i.e. above Woodstock, and linking to the wider Collective activities.

Kate Radloff is running a small propagation group near Tapawera with a few local farmers who are keen to grow their own locally-sourced native plants. If you are interested because you have native bush or riparian areas on your land and would like to do the same, feel free to get in touch with her on richkate73@gmail.com. We also want to kick off the thematic forestry group fairly soon on a more organised basis. If anyone has a strong desire to be part of that group, please email motcatchment@gmail.com. Since much of our catchment is in forestry, whether conservation land or exotic plantation, and with sediment flows out to the estuary of high concern not to mention slash & debris in floods, then having a specific group for the Collective focused on forestry is important. It's also not too long before those interested to plant trees this winter need to be turning their minds to the preparations for that.

Work is ongoing behind the scenes with the Collective's action plan and developing a survey that can provide good baseline information for funding and support for initiatives. Members of the Collective and Tapawera Connect have also been working together to seek support for tackling the Old Man's Beard (OMB) and weed issue around Shedwood Bush which is a problem that needs to be tackled sooner rather than later. It would be a great shame if the remnant podocarp forest were to become invaded by OMB. There are few areas around our locality that people can so easily

visit forest like Shedwood Bush with all the mature matai, other trees and birdsong. The Collective is also hopeful of gaining some tree seedlings for planting this winter by members besides more local efforts to eco-source & propagate our own. But as experience has shown, invasive weeds are a big problem for new & riparian plantings and a key concern already identified. OMB is an issue that the Collective wants to address in a far-sighted and collaborative manner that will take time and effort to develop, and it will need significant resources.

In the meantime, we all keep pushing on with efforts to make positive changes in what are challenging times, both for us as people and for our wider environment!

1/5th Anniversary of Tapawera Local Internet

In early 2016, I was invited by the Principal of Tapawera School to help with building an internet service to some of the families who needed it for school studies. Sites were chosen, local landowners helped immensely, and the initial towers were built. (you can see the solar panels of the site above the school).

As with any undertaking there were some initial teething problems, but we managed to overcome them one way or another.

2/ Endless Upgrades to here.

The principal activity between 2017 and 2021 was to upgrade the tower electrical systems, and replace the initial bearers (tower to tower links) radios with a much more powerful set of radios from a different manufacturer.

And an endless round of adding customers, which typically means installing another tower radio, a customer radio set, and a customer router, and set the wifi up.

This picture is indicative of how the towers are constructed. This actual tower is at the top of the NED, between Blenheim and Awatere Valley.


The Tapawera network is open to anyone who wishes to join. The installation cost is \$195, the customer router costs \$79, and the service fee is \$60 for an unlimited data service and the speed is typically 15-20Mbps.

Crown Infrastructure Holdings, with significant coercion from a new customer, kindly made a financial contribution to a new tower located at TUI, and this provided the impetus to also upgrade the electrics and aerials on the Tadmor tower. In turn customer access was upgraded within the Matariki valley and the Baton Valley.

March 2022

A large network upgrade is due to be installed on March 23rd 2022. For the first time ever, the network will have some spare capacity to accommodate more customers, and upgrade the speed of all the existing customers

The technical details are that the two 100Mbps circuits at the school become 2×1000 Mbps, and the network (currently split into two networks) will be split into 5 networks, each of which has twice as much bandwidth as each of the two previous networks.

It should be noted that when the network was originally built, the intention was to support Chromebook use at the school, email, web page access. In 2021/2022 this usage has mutated to include watching video, tv programs etc etc. To suggest that this change of use has added to the network load is a mild understatement.

Person "Donald Trump, because the world badly needs him!"





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
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Golden Bush Garden Club

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

For five days last week, we collected all our classroom waste. Our audit taught us that Landfill is our biggest problem. Our actions are that we have a Worm Farm almost up and running once our research is completed. This week, we focus on only having the classroom lights on when it is dark.
