Nick came highly recommended after he gave a presentation to the Richmond Age Concern Tea and Talk group. As we age and are determined to live independently as long as possible, we need to be extra vigilant around things that we have been doing, maybe for decades, that pose an added risk as our mobility decreases and our reactions are slower. When many are not just using a fireplace to keep the home warm, but also use wood-burning stoves to provide hot water and cooking facilities, as we do in our rural location, added caution is needed. It will be a useful discussion to have anyway, even if we already know it all. Maybe we might have some tips for him to pass on to others?!

After some time trying to sell his home of 30+ years in Tapawera, so he could move to be closer to his beloved Thelma, Fred Leov found some new owners, who were to move in mid June. Things moved ahead more quickly than initially anticipated and Fred's final day in the house was 30th May. 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




Antenno Mobile Phone App

Folk may not be aware of this very useful mobile phone app used by the Tasman District Council to inform people of weather events. road closures, water shutdowns, recycling and rubbish reminders and changes, events, and consultations. You can see a screenshot of a heavy rain warning to the right.

It is also a two-way channel so you can also engage with the council by reporting issues. If you find a pothole, a slip, flooding or a tree down simply open Antenno, go to 'Report it' and add a report to tell them about.





If you report something at the scene and have location turned on it pinpoints where the issue is. You can also attach a photo if appropriate.

You can also respond to surveys and provide feedback using the app.

Keeping Your Vehicle Safe and Secure

There are simple steps we can all take to reduce our chances of becoming a victim of vehicle crime:

- Always lock your vehicle when you leave it.
- Ensure any valuables are out of sight.
- Close all windows, including sunroofs.

- Park in well-lit areas if possible.
- Install a car alarm, steering lock, or good quality chains for extra security.
- When at home, ideally keep all vehicles in a garage or out of

- Keep in contact with your neighbours and let one another know if you notice any suspicious behaviour around vehicles in your neighbourhood.

Seed would also like to thank TDCC for the support for our Community Garden. We have been able to clear two skips worth of rubbish and make up planter boxes with your contribution.







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

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

From the Principal's Desk ...

Tēnā koutou e te Whānau ki te Kura o Tapawera

Attendance: Every day matters!

We all recognise that education is the pathway to the future. The key to educational success relies on being present at school. Why is it so important to attend school every day? Learning is a progressive activity; each day's lessons build upon those of the previous day(s). Reading the material and completing work independently does not compensate for the loss of insight gained during class discussions or the loss of competency acquired through explanation or supervised activities/tasks. Teachers use discussions, demonstrations, experiments and participation as part of the daily learning activities, and these cannot be made up by those absent. Regular student participation in daily classroom activities plays a significant role in a student's school success. Our school goal is for ākonga to attend school regularlyattending more than 90%. In Term 4 2022, our school achieved 60% of akonga attending school regularly. While this is higher than the national average, it still means that 40% of our akonga are not attending regularly enough, which we at Tapawera are working to address. Term 1 this year has yet to be released. Please support your akonga to come to school together to make everyday matter. 'Regular' attendance is 90% or higher for statistical purposes.

We look forward to all working together for a fabulous term.
