#### **Pride In Our Town**

(For this new regular feature, we will be interviewing someone new each month, asking what it is they love about living in the Tapawera area; what makes them proud to live here).

Our inaugural interview was with Sonny & Sue Grant

Sonny grew up in Dovedale and attended Tapawera District School, later starting work in the forestry before moving away and living in Gisborne for about 20 years. While he and Sue moved back to the area in about 2006 they finally settled in Tapawera itself about 6 years ago. While the decision was more financial, with Sue coming reluctantly – digging her heels in all the way, Sonny has realised that he has connected back to his whakapapa, and they both realise how precious that is.

Spring is their favourite time for planting and nourishing the ground and seeing new growth all around and they put a lot of effort into their own garden as well as helping out around the Village. Asked if there is a particular smell that they associate with Tapawera, Sue reckons she can smell the hops, even as they sprout out of the ground and they both love the smell of the hops, new hay and even silage. Sonny reckons he also loves the summer for the fishing and eeling too! They love that living here gives them the opportunity to be self-sustaining, with plenty of fresh food readily available if you put in the effort.

When asked if there was someone who has made a positive impact on their time living here, Sonny was very quick to say that he has loved reconnecting with his old school and rugby mate, John Rogers. He loves that they are fishing mates and can still spend time together. For Sue, that special person has to be Roger Bint! She loves how knowledgeable he is and how calming he is to talk to at the same time. She always feel that he honours and is respectful of people and she always comes away richer for the time spent with him.

Activities they both enjoy doing to connect with others is helping local farmers, helping keep the Village looking tidy, and for Sue, helping with the organised Seniors events.

While they're not big on swimming, they admitted that they have swum at the whirl hole near McLean's Reserve (pretty risky really), and Sonny does often throw himself into the river during Summer when he takes his dogs for a swim.

As for a favourite view, like many others, they are entranced by the constantly changing, but ever beautiful view of the mountains and also the view from up on the terrace, approaching Tapawera from Kohatu, of the valley with the river snaking it's way towards those mountains.

Asked what they'd miss most if they had to move away from Tapawera, Sonny said that he'd miss the farmers and the people.

(It was a delight to spend time with this couple and to be inspired by their passion for the people and the richness of where we live!)

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#### **Out and About Locally**

Recently I had the pleasure of hanging out with the year 6-7 -8 students (and teachers) down at the river/recreation area by the Tapawera bridge. Part of the River Nesting Bird Project, which the Community Led Development Program is supporting.



The objective for the students was to do a site assessment, produce a report of their findings, and then do a presentation to TDC, the Motueka Catchment Collective and Tapawera Connect. The students also have been busy 'digging in' with trial plantings of trees for the TDC.

Combined with these students the year 9 Art class is researching, designing and painting signs to be placed at the river, to inform and educate the community on the presence of the Black Billed Gull and the Black Fronted Terns between Sept-March. Historically Taylors Contracting had such signage that they placed at the river, unfortunately over the years these have been damaged or taken. Isn't it wonderful that our students and school are keen to get involved in protecting these amazing birds special to Tapawera. Keep an eye out for these original pieces of artwork popping up down at the river soon!



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
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#### Stand by - no don't - for Climate Change

In September I was invited along to one of the workshops held by the Nelson & Tasman Councils' team who are working to assess regional climate change risks and so be better able to identify what should be done to mitigate or adapt to the changes. There were five workshops and I went to the one focused on the 'natural domain'. Others were held on the built environment, human, economic and governance 'domains'. They are using a 'dynamic adaptive pathways planning' process and following planning guidance recommendations from the Ministry for Environment. Given that our future is uncertain and some of it deeply uncertain, any regional planning tool needs to be adaptive and updated as new scientific data & other measures come to light. Otherwise it's just a snapshot document with recommendations tied to that moment.

There were about 70 of us at different tables and we had to consider the elements associated with different 'risk interests' identified in the environment / 'natural domain' including risk interests associated with indigenous terrestrial, marine and freshwater ecosystems and organisms and risks to exotic ecosystems and species. For us in Tapawera, although embedded in the whole environment, most of us are probably more connected to the exotic ecosystems like farming and forestry and gardening and maybe we should count ourselves as an exotic species! Below is the sheet that our group came up with for the risk elements associated with exotic ecosystems and species. Because we are the ones with a high responsibility for influencing these ecosystems, we also have a much greater capacity to adapt and make changes to them that can benefit us and our wider

community and environment. We can't as individuals do too much about ocean temperatures rising! One of the things that wasn't highlighted enough in the planning framework presented was the importance and inclusion of food production (and timber uses) so it was good to bring attention to it.

The Risk Assessment team picked three scenario timings to consider – representing the short, medium and long term view. They were years 2030, 2070 and 2130. We were given some indication of predictions at those dates of temperature, rainfall, storms, sealevel rise, heavy rain, drought, disease etc. for us here in Tasman. For instance, sea level rise in 2070 is projected to be between 0.5 and 0.7m and then in

2130, it is projected to be between 1.5 and 2m. Very significant for coastal inundation but will no doubt affect us all in some way. For snowfall, by 2130 many places that usually receive snowfall would experience greater rainfall instead etc. We then had to consider the scenarios and come up with 'climate impact consequence levels' ranging from insignificant to extreme and our confidence in picking the level. All got a bit depressing and extreme for 2130.

Once the contributions from this series of workshops have been analysed and incorporated, there will be another series of workshops in November that will be more area specific and one of the outputs of the whole process will be to have a 'Nelson Tasman Risk Explorer' that we as well as Council staff and others can access.

Hopefully, as individuals and as a broader community, we will choose to become more informed about climate change risks and make sensible choices, not necessarily easy ones, that spread the benefits rather than the costs, to our future generations. What we are starting to experience now is the consequence of previous scenarios and actions. Our generation and the previous generation will have significantly affected what we are about to experience in this next short term phase. What we do now is what will affect those in the medium term - our children and grandchildren. For quite a lot of us, our grandparents and relatives went to fight and die in wars to safeguard their community's freedom and ours. Maybe we should see the threat we face from climate change in a similar light and start to take stronger action and make sacrifices for the sake of lives and future life on this planet?

#### **Welcoming Back Our River Nesting Birds!**

If you live, work, or walk by the Motueka river between the Kohatu bridge and the Wangapeka confluence, you may have noticed there has been a bit more action going on by the water recently (not including the gravel work of course!) This is because the tarapirohe (black-fronted terns) and the tarāpuka (black-billed gulls) are making their way from the coast looking for suitable places inland for them to start nesting. Watching the terns fly as they dive down into the water for a feed is stunning, so worth looking out for!

Interestingly, while gravel work is a complex topic, it can be good for both us and the birds, helping to mitigate flooding whilst providing some awesome spots for the birds to consider. Many of the weedy high areas have been removed, leaving the clear low islands that help to protect them when nesting from ground predators like stoats and rats.

As Nicky from Tapawera Connect has mentioned, it is great to have students from the school on board, doing some fantastic work to look at how we can enjoy both the river and the river nesting birds. With year 9 working on signs to remind us about nesting, it is worth noting that two of the best ways to support them is to keep an eye on your dogs when walking by the river and also to not drive on the riverbed, especially the islands. Simple actions like this can make a huge difference to the survival of these endangered taonga species during their nesting season.

How we give effect to the Treaty of Waitangi, by including tikanga, matauranga, and Te Ao Maori in their plans, taking reasonable steps to teach about Tikanga Maori and te reo Maori and achieving equitable outcomes for Maori students.

What should you expect from our school? We want to talk to you about what's working, what isn't, and what is important for your child. This will help us determine what our goals should be. We want to make sure all learners and parents have copies of our plans that are written in a way that is easy to understand. We will report to you each year on how they are going, including the difference they are making to learners' progress and well-being.

This is an exciting time for our kura and community as we work together to plan and set out priorities. We will be in touch with our next steps and how you can provide feedback to us.

Thanks for supporting **The Cancer Foundation**. We got some great footage of the gumboot conga line, gumboot throwing and 3-legged races as part of our mentor time. Very entertaining and had lots of happy faces.

There is a lot of **paperwork involved in taking tamariki on trips**. The process is very long and involves lots of people to check things to ensure safety:

- 1. We start with a proposal to the Senior Leadership Team, who then approves the trip.
- 2. Notices go home to whanau about the trip and request permission. Often this is also put on a school loop to make it easier for parents to sign
- 3. Next we seem to be chasing forms to be returned for which we need your help talk to us ASAP regarding changes to a trip as transport lists need to be created. Some children just don't turn up!
- 4. On the day we check attendance then ensure the accurate transport lists go to the office (in the unlikely event of an emergency Barbara needs this information at her fingertips). If this keeps changing it is hard to ensure it is correct.
- 5. Safety Action Plans are written (SAP) to ensure all bases are covered if something goes wrong
- 6. If it is overnight or high-risk activity etc. This paperwork goes to the BOT Board of Trustees.

We love going on trips and giving our tamarki wonderful experiences, but we need these to be actioned by whanau ASAP - we cannot continue to chase forms/skool loop permission - otherwise, some children will simply miss out.

**Sarah Bouchut** has joined our teaching team this term for two days a week. She is working with the year 7-8s learning about online apps and the Google Classroom, as well as some senior study classes.

#### SENIOR'S SNIPPETS with Janine Leeden

At this point I'm excited to be part of the negotiations with Nelson Tasman Community Transport Trust, coming from the older persons angle, trying to find solutions to the limited transport opportunities in Tapawera. This service will be limited to connecting people to the new eBus service in Wakefield, or to Richmond or Motueka for individuals to complete their chores, but I am hoping to also utilise this vehicle to help connect our Seniors with other groups and activities in the region as well. As a Community we have to show that this will be well utilised if we are to secure it, and even access to a larger capacity vehicle going forward. Our

response will determine whether TDC will even consider funding this vital service, now that they have invested heavily in the eBuses that service the other larger towns. Let's all 'get onboard' to support this service!

The first week in October will see me trialling the demand with this 6 seat capacity (with the driver included) to attend a couple of annual Senior's events. It will come down to first in gets a seat! There will be a minimal cost to cover mileage of the vehicle, to be confirmed.

On Sunday, 1st October I will be taking the vehicle to Motueka for the Positive Ageing Expo, 9.30am-3.30pm, 10 Pah Street, Motueka. (This is just down the road from the Countdown supermarket if anyone wanted to wander down and grab a few groceries, though the vehicle doesn't have a huge area for a big shop).

The purpose of the Expo is to bring people together, find ways to engage and connect with community groups and discover new ways to help each other. The overall aim is for everyone to improve their personal well-being There will be 30+ stalls inside and 8 or so outside on the grass, a fun day overall. # Travelling Tapawerans

attended the Nelson Tasman Community Transport Trust AGM in August with the aim of Tapawera being included in their service coverage. The Trust started some years ago with the community bus from Wakefield and they then started a service from Mapua. There wasn't anyone championing it from Tapawera. Now they have a service from Motueka. The Trust relies on volunteer drivers. The Trust's efforts which were supported by TDC have helped to contribute to the establishment of the eBus network. Now the Trust needs to make changes to ensure their efforts complement these new public transport services.

The Trust's objectives include providing and operating a community transport service - in particular transport for those disadvantaged without car access; for health, recreation and education travel purposes (whilst working collaboratively alongside other groups and businesses that provide transport services to the Tasman community). The Trust also seeks to reduce our reliance on private car travel and on fossil fuels, and to encourage more sustainable travel options including using electric vehicles where possible.

The Trust have now proposed that their Wakefield community bus (its actually a comfortable 6-seater including driver that is a hybrid vehicle) be based here for the Tapawera community for now, for travel towards Nelson or Motueka, the former route would include picking existing Wakefield passengers.

A group of us in Tapawera have been taking forward the idea with Anita, the Trust's part-time transport and marketing coordinator and some of us are registering with the Trust to be volunteer drivers. There has been quite a bit of consultation in the past about transport service demand and reintroducing a bus service from Tapawera but it hasn't seemed viable. We want to pilot some trips and ways of sharing journeys that make necessary or special trips more fun, more possible and more affordable – and it's probably good to start with a small bus vehicle.

Also, given the price of fuel and that the eBus from Wakefield that goes to Richmond with an express connection to the hospital and Nelson only costs \$6 a trip with a Bee card, is cheaper for youth or can be free with a gold card, it makes sense to connect to and use it!

If you are willing and interested to be a volunteer driver and help make this community transport initiative a reality, and/or are keen to use this service, we will be having a get together at the Kohatu Flat Rock Café on Thursday 5th October at 3.15pm to check out the bus and brainstorm the details of how we are going to start using it for trips. If you can't come but are interested,

please get in touch with Anita Parkes at marketingntctt@gmail.com or on mobile 0226822373. Elsewhere in the Informer are more details on the eBus service from Wakefield and on the fares and details can be found at the links below. There are three trips in during the morning and another 3 in the afternoon starting from 7.04am from Wakefield and the last one back from Nelson leaves at 17.25 with journeys taking around 40 minutes. The electric buses also have two cycle carriers on the front as did the old ones.

The clocks will have gone forward by the time this article comes out and I am sure we are all looking forward to the warmer months coming. It has been a hard winter for many and we have seen guite a lot of sickness in our community.

There has been a greater need for urgent care and acute appointments, and we continue to be full up with patients and tightly manage who we can see.

We triage (manage) many of our appointments through our clinical team so we can best respond on a clinical need basis. This will involve getting a call from a doctor or a nurse and it is important that you have your **phone** available and answer our call which will show as "Private Number" on your phone.

We have also seen an increase in the number of patients who do not turn up for their booked appointments, which in view of our lack of appointments will certainly mean we could have seen someone else. If you are not going to be able to make it, please call us with as much notice as possible and we will be able to see another patient. Even if you can only give us short notice, an hour for example, please still call us.

Some clarification for **Repeat Prescriptions**. Once we have received your request it will take up to 48 working hours to issue the prescriptions. If you request an urgent prescription this will take up to 24 working hours. By far the best way with your medication is to put a request in a week in advance of when you will need it. This can be done by phone or through the portal or even come and speak to our receptionists at the Practice.

#### **Burglary and Theft Prevention Advice**

Put yourself in a burglar's shoes. If you think like them then you can identify security risks around your home or your property.

The following tips can minimise opportunities:

- Lock and secure your doors and windows, including your sheds and garages.
- Photograph and record the make, model and serial numbers of valuables.
- Consider engraving your tools and bicycles with a unique identifier such as your driver's license number.
- · Consider installing sensor lights.
- Keep hedges and plants well-trimmed do not give burglars a place to hide.
- Check and maintain damaged fencing and locks.
- Note down car registrations and report descriptions of suspicious vehicles or persons - burglars often scope a place out in advance.
