Bore Drilling Set to Start on Tapawera Water Treatment Plant

October 23, 2024

Work is about to begin on the new Tapawera water treatment plant with bore drilling expected to start within the next six weeks.

This project will install two new exterior bores and construct a replacement Water Treatment Plant building to improve the treatment process for water in Tapawera by upgrading systems that work to treat water using UV, chlorine and filtration.

The bores will be drilled and developed, then pump tested and sampled over the next five months.

Other work will then follow to install the underground/power supply components of the project, likely to be mid-2025, before the building and internals are constructed in 2026.

The plant will be commissioned and online by Christmas 2026, whereupon we can decommission the existing plant and bores on the other side of the road.

Having a resilient water supply that continues to meet national drinking water standards is the big driver of the initiative.

The new plant will treat the water to a higher standard and

be more reliable, but flow and pressure won't change.

The existing bores constructed in 1954 are at the end of their life and the building is too small to upgrade to meet drinking water standards. These bores are within the building so limits options for maintenance, renewals or upgrades.

The initiative pre-dates central government initiatives such as 3 Waters Reform and Local Water Done Well, harking back to the 2018-2028 Long Term Plan.

Local Water Done Well gives Councils an opportunity to determine a different delivery model that is fit for our community and ensures this service is long term financially sustainable.

However, we don't think it diminishes our obligation to meet regulatory requirements for water quality. If we wait to deliver the project, there is a risk of not being compliant if old assets are allowed to fail.

There is expected to be little effect on water supply during the life of the project, other than potentially some short shutdowns when connecting the plant to the existing network and commissioning.

There will be some need for temporary traffic management on Tadmor Valley Road when we reach the construction stages but that should also be minimal.

A great team of locals along with Tapawera Connect and with the support of Nelson Tasman Emergency Management have been working on getting Tapawera's Emergency Preparedness Plan updated and completed.

Its purpose is to enable, empower, and support individuals and our community to take ownership of our emergency preparedness. This increases the resilience of our community to the impacts of hazards. It promotes problem solving and encourages our community to be self-sufficient through strong social networks and a culture of mutual help. It also helps to reduce their reliance on first responder agencies that in a time of emergency will be stretched to full capacity.

It's a timely reminder that when emergencies happen, our community may need to be self-sufficient for several days. Here are some ways you can prepare now for an

emergency so when the time comes your household will be informed and ready.



Think about having a "Neighbours Day" for your street or road. Throw on a BBQ and get to know your neighbours and how you can support each other and

potentially share resources in a time of emergency. For more info visit neighboursday.org.nz



Make a "Household Plan". Create a central point of contact outside of your community for your family in an emergency, and consider who in your whanau or close friends may need extra support during an emergency. To make a

Make a "Pet/animal Plan". The Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI) has advice for preparing a plan for your animals. It includes checklists for different types of animals and different emergencies. Work through the checklists to develop your plan. Visit

Have a "Grab Bag" ready for an emergency. Work out what supplies you need for all your whanau. A grab bag is a small bag with essential supplies. Each bag should have:

- Walking shoes, warm clothes, raincoat and hat
- Water and snack food (remember babies and pets too)
- Hand sanitiser
- Portable phone charger
- ◊ Cash
- Copies of important documents and photo ID

Remember any medications you might need and keep your first aid kit, mask or face covering, torch, radio and batteries somewhere you can grab them in a hurry. "Stay informed". Social media like Facebook has a "NZ Civil Defence" site which has official emergency information and advice on how to be better prepared for disasters in New Zealand. Find out and discuss how to prepare for an emergency, cope during an event, and recover quickly.

Emergency Mobile Alert is a way of receiving information about emergencies in your area. If your life, health or property is in danger, Emergency Mobile Alerts can be sent to your mobile. You don't need to sign up or download an app.

If the power goes out, a solar- or battery-powered radio (or your car radio) can help you keep up to date with the latest news. In an emergency, tune to these stations:

We are carrying on with our Tuesday and Wednesday transport services to Richmond and Motueka respectively that leave the Community Centre at 9.30am. See the separate poster elsewhere. We will continue until the end of November and possibly through to Christmas before we make changes. Please take advantage of the cheap fare (\$6 each way) to go into town and even to the Aquatic Centre in Richmond for a discounted swim. It's a fun social way of going to town too. It is best that you book ahead to ensure your seat and pay in advance. It is possible to get a ride and pay on the day providing there are already passengers booked. We rely on our team of volunteer drivers to support this initiative and are grateful to the Motueka isite and TDC for supporting this service.

The Serena van is also starting to be used more for group trips, particularly by seniors and also youth which is perhaps as important a transport use as a regular passenger service. We are now up to 10 registered volunteer drivers who either drive on the roster or have registered as a driver to then drive for their group's events. We'd encourage more groups to nominate members to register which includes them being police vetted as drivers.

We are really pleased to have Jude Tarr join the Trust as a new part-time Transport Trust Coordinator who started in the second half of October and is picking up the reins of supporting what we are currently doing in Tapawera and exploring what we might be able to do in the future as well as ongoing initiatives elsewhere in the District. She will have been out to Tapawera to meet drivers and others who have been part of our travel initiative in October. With a background in customer care and marketing that spans from cycling to air travel and supporting solar power, she should be a great asset for the Trust and local communities with the aim to enable travel in the Nelson Tasman region that supports community well-being for everyone and enhances the health of our environment. Letter to the Editor

Thursday last week while I knew of a meeting it was only by chance after I had checked the Civil Defence radio as I've done in part with Ian Swafford for the last 16 or so years. When heading home on my 'Company vehicle' I see the gathering related to the push to destroy the old shop risking inevitable damage to the 'Gateway Gardens' & the Historical Society 'Army hut' & the 'Kiwi Halt' building.

I found a gathering of persons, some being in favour of a brand new 'Hub' and the balance like myself totally against the idea put forward by the 'Connect' people. Pheobe Quinliven with two TDC staff, one being the TDC Project Manager apparently often involved in historical buildings, Martin his name. He should now be quite aware of the reaction of the 16 or so who gathered to oppose this proposed vandalism. Complete with a phone link to Stu Bryant clearly expecting some support for this ridiculous idea.

Steve Udy of TDCC seemed quite floored by the opposition against this ruination and enormous costs entailed. Mrs Quinliven left the meeting (considered bad form) though I didn't myself notice. I spoke first, I having done a lot of work on the historic building & know its soundness. An appraisal shared by builder Mark Newcombe who also knows of its soundness. All waffle about earthquake risk dismissed. The building stood two major quakes and sits on good natural foundations. Two older Gentlemen who were involved with the old shop when it was given by the NZ forest Service to TDCC who own it (If TDC want to buy it?).

My time as TDCC Councillor taught me how devious TDC can be. You elect a Mayor and Councillors. But the Staff unelected do as they please, not answerable to elected persons & create paper empires in their various fields. "The tail wags the dog" is how I'd put it. Like the well exceeding 500 thousands ratepayers & government money to lower the main road several feet so the Motor Sport Park can better see the junction. It's a private venture! Hardly useable and a fire risk that fleeing cars on a narrow road would prevent any fire engine. But despite all the TDCC Council opposing this boondoddle the unelected engineering minions wanted it & beamed "Three Ducks in a row, it's going ahead". I told Kempthorne what I thought of him & his minions.

I've had input in the 'Gateway' construction & both Historical Society buildings as have Menz Shed, I worked on the church & the school shows. Quite apart from the Regimental Emblem which cost no- one anything. Just good old Tapaweran help out. But the Territorials come each Anzac Day to visit it. Others as we went round affirmed the need to preserve the Trec House Come Council Chambers Come OP shop that WAS absolutely brilliant. Full of good stuff & people came from far & near.

Now it's all a few old togs, a complete ruin of its former money bringing usefulness. Many others added their support; John Ellis, Geoff Profit, Dean Wells, Susan Creedy, Joe Higgins added their opposition, as did others I can't recall but can't not recall the effervescent Sharan Rogers of the Tapawera Promotion Society Gateway Gardens. Roger Carleton & Phil Cain suggested the vacant pub would be an ideal location being well adapted to do meals, fish& chips & drinks in an intentionally cosy setting, it would make money & give employment plus it rented rooms. The young gentleman who actually ran it is his self a capable chef and would make an ideal manager. It would answer for any 'Hub' & it's got all the features & the young gentleman who practically ran it would make a good manager. Susan Fenemor, & the effervescent Sharen Rogers, spoke against the plan. She like myself a Tapawera Promotion Assn member, Finally Roger Carleton added his views as to its historic importance.

The message seemed more than clear, Tapawera doesn't want nor need any costly flash 'Hub' to put the rates up. Tapawera has plenty of meeting halls the school staff rooms & the sports hall, rugby club, the Druids hall. People don't want a new built out Wakefield or Richmond. It's the only settlement you can hear the moreporks as opposed to constant morons. When the organized 'Connect 'people started I made a point to visit their meetings knowing full well local response wasn't always too forthcoming but it now seems to have snow balled into great self importance. The bus idea, the old folks meetings all very laudable. But the ruination to spend hugely on the new Hub notion is decidedly a step too far, as was thought very evident that morning.

Who are the Kahurangi midwives and what do you offer

Annabel Kennedy and I studied together at Ara and when I discovered she planned to move to our area with her partner, we were excited to build a partnership here and be able to fully support the community.

We formed a group practice with 2 very experienced midwives in rural Tasman and created Kahurangi midwives, hoping to build a sustainable collaborative practice structure which allowed us to support each other in a time when the shortage of midwives becomes increasingly difficult to navigate.

Annabel and I care for women from Brightwater to Springs Junction and will take all whanau from our area looking for midwifery services.

We have regular clinics in Murchison hospital and have our own comfy clinic room in the Tapawera Community centre building as well as doing home visits. We support births at home, Motueka Primary unit and Nelson hospital.



Lisa Butcher - Her Story



I grew up in Hawkes Bay and hitchhiked to Nelson on a whim in 2000, starting off picking apples and working at Sealord. I moved to Motupiko in 2004, with my now husband Jason, while managing the Pumpkin Patch child's clothing store in Nelson. 
Your vision for the future

Super Silverbeet

Glossy silverbeet's flourishing in gardens everywhere right now - a happy sight, in my opinion. I grew up eating it well boiled - not a great

memory - but now love it shredded in salads, quiches, curries, and as a colourful nutrition-boost addition to many other dishes. It's great in recipes like fritters and pancakes, that your kids might like. Adding a flavour component like a small amount of bacon mince or cheese may even persuade your kids that it's yummy.

Low cost and very easy to grow, it's a pity not to use silverbeet in a range of dishes. Also known as 'swiss chard' or 'chard', silverbeet can be substituted for spinach in many recipes. Here's one that uses silverbeet and potato (either leftovers or fresh) that I've tried and enjoyed, partly because it's SO simple. And it's encouraged me to add other veg as well to mashed potato, a way I've easily increased the number of veg I eat in a meal - all good, in line with current nutrition and climate-focused eating guidelines.

Cheesy Greens and Potatoes 4 cups uncooked silverbeet (or other greens), washed and cooked until just tender (4-5 minutes). Drain well and roughly chop. Melt 60g butter/oil, add 6 finely chopped spring onions (or other oniony veg) and fry gently for about 5 minutes. Combine with 2 cups cooked potatoes (needs about 5 small raw), roughly mashed, seasoned with salt and pepper. Combine greens and potatoes and reheat if necessary. Add 1 cup crumbled or grated cheese (any variety) to vegetables and lightly mix until the cheese starts to melt. Put onto a plate or into a bowl. The aim is to enjoy mouthfuls of melting cheese amongst the veg. 1-4 servings (appetite dependent) (Recipe source - Nigel Slater: A Cook's Book)

And more - Years ago when I worked in hospital food service there was a menu item called 'Marble', which was mashed carrot and parsnip. (I wonder if the name confused many patients?) These are two other veg that are great to mix with mashed spud and greens for a rainbow on your plate or on top of your shepherd's pie. Reducing leftovers in the fridge is an additional benefit that many of us would appreciate.

We are about to change the Richmond Library Collection again so if there is anything you would like to see or for us to try and get in, let us know and we will do our best to make it happen.




